We have been able to make two donations to Canons Ashby.



A small one to fund a wooden mud kitchen in the children's play area. We have permission to show this photo of a little boy enjoying using it and I think the team hope to add some pots and pans!

A larger donation of £1,000 is to support a new project: the creation of a dedicated display celebrating the life and work of Louis Osman (1914–1996), one of Britain's most innovative silversmiths, jewellery designers, and architects.

The project would establish a fixed display space, featuring 14 collection items, including recent acquisitions of Osman's jewellery, alongside silver pieces, design drawings, and his architect's desk .

Visitors would also enjoy a film of Osman at work. This would be the only long-term display dedicated to Osman in the UK, offering unprecedented access to the elements of the Trust's modern decorative arts collection.

Canons Ashby is seeking to raise £10,000 and hopes to open the display in the summer of 2026

The association still has a lot going for it but could benefit from younger people with ideas and energy.

We are also appealing for help at meetings – particularly with the chairs. This can be any able-bodied person who can come in early (we open the hall an hour before the meeting).

Whilst Alain has been shown the technical information on setting up the meeting, he is not always available so we desperately need someone with this type of expertise who can back him up.

Looking at the past year, we can say that it was successful with a wide range of speakers bringing a good attendance at meetings. As George flagged up this time last year, our outings programme shrank considerably to just six including the Christmas lunch. The reports back indicated that they were much enjoyed. However, we miss Pauline as Visits Co-ordinator and we struggled to find organisers for next year – Pam has managed to finalise the coach trips George had set up and we have two car visits. Maybe, the demand for outings has lessened in recent years and it's time to rethink our programme.

Financially, we are still in a good position and we have been able to make some donations to Canons Ashby (see p2).

We are keen for the association to continue, I hope you are too.

We were very sad to learn of the death of George on 9 September who had become a mainstay of RNTA. He became Meetings Secretary in 2012 and was still holding that position when he died. Over the years, he devised a programme of autumn and winter lectures covering a wide range of subjects to suit all tastes and interests. I imagine some of the subjects were dear to his heart with his great interest in art. This role also entailed welcoming the speakers and conversing with them during the interval which he did with aplomb. Later he took on introducing the meetings and making everyone very welcome when we failed to find a chairman to replace Roy Deacon.

When George first began organising outings, he and I had made the same suggestion, so we planned and led the visit to Port Sunlight together in Spring 2014. That was the first of many he ran mainly supported by Val – a total of 12. The Bodleian Library and Ashmolean Museum trip to Oxford was especially interesting being very different from most of our outings. Probably the most memorable was to Windsor Castle in 2018 and the recent one to Hatfield House.

He gave so much to the Association but I hope he also enjoyed his membership as he and Val went on many of our outings and attended the Christmas lunches each year.

George was a key figure and will be sorely missed. He, together with Val, brought to us their ideas, skills, wide interests and commitment.

Flaxmill Maltings, Shrewsbury

Thursday, 7 May, 2026

Newly restored, the Flaxmill Malting is celebrated as the grandparent of modern skyscrapers.

Opening in 1797 as a purpose-built mill to process flax, commonly used in the manufacture of linen, this was the first multifloored iron-framed building in the world.

There is the Jubilee Tower, giving visitors the opportunity to climb to the viewing gallery to experience fantastic views of Shrewsbury and the surrounding countryside. This was constructed in 1897 as part of the transformation of the site from a flax mill to a barley maltings. It houses the machinery that powered the grain elevators that moved the barley around the building and honoured Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee. For those unable to manage the climb there is a video of the journey to the top of the tower and the views, accessible by lift.

We aim to arrive about 10.30 am and will be divided into groups for the Behind the Scene tour. The rest of the time is for you to explore the Mill Exhibition on the ground floor, visit the café and Mill shop. The cost of refreshments is not included in the price.

Note: the tour does involve climbing stairs although part of the building can be accessed by lift.

It is an English Heritage site and members may be given a refund on the day.

Please bring your EH card with you.

When timings of the tours are agreed, there may be time to visit Attingham Park, a short drive away. Please bring your NT card with you or be prepared to pay if you are not a NT member. The coach cannot park at the Maltings so be ready to board the coach at 2 pm or as advised on the day. There will be time to explore the grounds and have tea.

The coach then leaves at 4 pm to be back in Bilton about 6pm



Ashby St Ledgers Church

The pretty village of Ashby St Ledgers lies off the A361 between Kilsby and Daventry which until fairly recently was owned by Lord Wimbourne.

On arrival we are given a talk about the history and links with the Catesby family and the Gunpowder plot.



Then there is time to look around the church—the oldest parts of the present church are from the 1100s. There is a rare three decker pulpit.

About 3.15 pm you can make your way to the village hall where tea/coffee and cake are served. There are also toilets, not available at the church.

If you have the energy after tea, you can wander around the village and view the Manor House.

A few notes about finding the church will be sent to those booking when the forms are returned after 1st March

Maxstoke Castle, near Coleshill, a short distance off the A45, is a fine example of a 14th century, moated and fortified manor house.

It was built in 1345 to a rectangular plan with octagonal towers and is surrounded by a moat.

It has been owned and lived in by its present owner, the Fetherston-Dilke family for over 400 years.

It includes the ceremonial rooms, historical artefacts and the Lady Tower.



The tour will be led by Edwina, wife of the owner.

There are extensive formal and informal gardens which can be enjoyed at leisure. The head gardener will be available for questions.

Kenwood House, London

Kenwood House, overlooking Hampstead Heath, was designed by Robert Adam. Apart from its fine historic interiors, sculptures, furniture and jewellery, it has an internationally renowned collection of paintings including works by Vermeer, Van Dyck, Gainsborough, Reynolds and Rembrandt, including his "Portrait with Two Circles".

The collection of paintings has grown from an initial gift of 63 works. It was bequeathed in 1928 by Edward Cecil Guinness, 1st Earl of Iveagh, to evoke the atmosphere of an 18th century gentleman's house.

There are extensive grounds to explore.



We aim to arrive about 10.30am and will be divided into groups for a guided tour. Then you will have time to explore further and buy refreshments. Please note that it is a cashless site and the cost of refreshments is not included in the cost of the outing. It is an English Heritage site and EH members may be given a refund on the day. Please bring your EH card with you.

The coach cannot park onsite so be ready to board at 3pm for the return journey back to Bilton arriving about 5 pm.

Our visit to The Charterhouse

We had very good visits to the Charterhouse in Coventry over two consecutive weeks. I was part of the second group which was lucky enough to get an unexpected tour by a guide who was steeped in its history.

The wall paintings are a remarkable survival of the priory's chequered past.
