Letter from the Committee

Welcome to a new season of Rugby National Trust activities and to this Autumn 2023 Newsletter. We can look back to 2022-23 as a season where happily attendances at our talks have grown back slowly to pre-Covid levels and the Association seems to be getting along quite well. All the lectures have been enjoyable, recent highlights being "Treading the Duckboards" by Kate Wills, and the outstanding "William Cavendish and the Building of Chatsworth" by Gill White.

Behind this however, there are reasons for us to be perhaps more than a little concerned. The programme of visits this summer had to be curtailed beyond recognition (only one coach trip was feasible!) due to lack of organisers and, while we are working towards a better list of trips for 2024, we don't anticipate as extensive a programme as pre-2020. And without more people volunteering to organise visits, there is unlikely to be substantial improvement. Since this is our major source of income, our finances will remain static, with no real scope for making significant donations any time soon to the National Trust or its local properties.

So our reason for existence looks like shifting more towards being a social club for people interested in history and heritage which it has always been, partly, and our members may well be quite happy with that. But even so, the ageing of Committee members with possible incidence of health problems suggests to us that we shall probably not be able to carry on in the same way, and things may get harder in the next year or two. Already, to help with physical matters at meetings, and as announced elsewhere in this Newsletter, we are suspending the Sales Table indefinitely, and shall be asking audience members at talks to assist with setting up and clearing away of chairs, tables and other equipment.

Beyond that, the prospect of closure of RNTA looms. We are as yet reluctant to issue any deadlines, as none of us want to just give up too soon. But unless a new Committee of like-minded members and friends is created, closure in the next year or two will be a realistic and inevitable outcome. Of course we hope that the situation can be rescued. Things are that serious.

Meanwhile, we are carrying on with a full programme of lectures for 2023-24, described herein, and as good a series of visits for next summer as we can arrange. We thank you for your continued support and continue to welcome all your ideas and suggestions.

On the next page is an appreciation of Barrie Bemand, one of our most valued members, who sadly passed away in April; especially for the numerous visits he and his wife Lynne organised over the years.

Barrie Bemand

Barrie died in April after quite a long illness.

Many know of Barrie as a local GP. Malcolm Tennant remembers him as his works doctor at GEC for a number of years until his retirement – "He had to pass me medically fit so I could travel the world for GEC". For several years he was also Chairman of Rugby NHS Primary Care Trust.

Barrie was a keen supporter of the National Trust being both a member of RNTA and a volunteer room guide at Upton House. For our Spring Newsletter in 2021, he wrote an article on 'Upton House during Covid-19'

Barrie was a regular organiser of outings from 2013, often supported on these trips by his wife, Lynne. These visits were to interesting and sometimes unusual places including:

THE RUGBY NATIONAL TRUST ASSOCIATION Minutes of the 35th Annual General Meeting held in the Dunchurch Village Hall on 19h January 2023 at 2.30pm

George Brunav took the chair and opened the meeting by welcoming 59 Association Members. George requested members to collect the spring 2023 newsletters from the table at the side of the hall before the AGM as they contained the agenda and summary of the accounts.

- 1. *Apologies* had been received Christine Dales, Peter Elliott, Jane Walker, Barrie and Lynne Bemand, Susan Woollard, Helen Bennett and Margaret Clements.
- 2. *Minutes of the* 34rd *Annual General Meeting* were printed in the Autumn 2022 Newsletter and were not read out at this AGM.

Val Brunavs proposed that the minutes be approved, seconded by Rona Townsend and George Brunavs signed them as a true record.

3. There were no *Matters Arising*

4 Treasurer's Report

Tim Seakins gave the following Treasurer's report:

First of all, I have to admit to not having done the bulk of the work on the accounts since I took over in September, after Pam Southern had acted as Treasurer so efficiently and produced the summary of accounts which she passed on to me in very good order. So thanks are due to her and to Ian Stimson for his work as Examiner of Accounts. I should also like to thank the rest of the Committee for their help and support.

If you study the accounts, you will see that we get income mainly from membership fees, but also from meetings' admissions, the raffles and the sales table. Thanks are due to Malcolm Tennant for running the sales table and to Val Brunavs for organising the raffles.

Meetings actually cost money, for the hire of the Hall and the speakers' fees; but they are partly what the Association exists for. The trips and visits made a profit of about £850 and next year we will get a little more interest on the Business Reserve Account. The cost of printing has risen but membership income remains about the same, so annual fees can remain at £10 for individuals and £15 for couples. I am always available to answer any members' questions!

Tony Birch proposed that the Treasurer's report be approved seconded by Val Brunavs

5 Committee Report

George Brunavs gave the following committee report:

As at the start of every new year, we wish all our members the best of everything for 2023, and reflect on how the previous year has been for our Association. We have managed to present a full programme of talks at DVH, highlights from which have been the visit of Paul Forecast, the Director of Midlands and East England National Trust at January's AGM, "Northampton Guildhall", "Queen Victoria – a Life in Portraits", Keith Holmes' photographic essay on "Bridges in Britain", and "Stoneywell and the Gimson Family" by Mark Temple. Summer visits re-started in 2022 and there was a really good Christmas Lunch at Compton Verney.

Audience numbers at talks have been around the 40-50 level, a noticeable drop from pre-Covid days; whether this is somehow an after-effect from the pandemic or due to the current economic hard times, we don't know. Despite that, what is certain and very gratifying is that our membership has stayed unchanged over the past year, with welcome new members balancing a few who have left.

Financially we are also in a stable and healthy state and hope to be able to resume donations to local NT properties within this new year; that will depend on communications with those properties and the NT itself. Also at present they will have to be careful and circumspect, as there is a potential concern regarding our future financial well-being. As you will notice from the new issue of the Newsletter, there is a much smaller number of Summer visits planned for 2023, and they are a major source of our income every year. The reduced number is due to previous visits organisers retiring and, to return the programme to the full strength of previous years, we do need new organisers.

This is a serious appeal and a notice to this effect is also in the Newsletter. A big drop in income could threaten the Association's very existence. A different but equally serious looming problem concerns our Committee. Over the last few years we have many times asked members to volunteer to fill vacancies; and we are very thankful to Tim Seakins for stepping up to be our new Treasurer, and also to Adrian Futter, who became our Membership Secretary a couple of years ago. With their vital help we appear to be managing reasonably well, although other Committee members are still undertaking more than one role. But they are ageing, and their retirement is likely in the not too distant future.

5 Committee Report (cont)

All this a "reality check" that we must face if we value our Association and want it to carry on. We don't want to reach a "crisis point", either from lack of finance from visits, or because of a collapsing number on the Committee. Please talk to us if you think you might be able to help or would like to find out more. We are still doing well – but we can't ignore the clouds on the horizon. A number of National Trust Supporter groups like ours have closed down in recent years, doubtless for similar reasons.

Pam Southern proposed that the Committee report be approved, seconded by Janet Frankl

6 Election of Officers and Committee

George Brunavs advised the membership, that for the election or re-election of the committee for 2023, some of the people standing for re-election have already served for a full 8 years. According to our constitution, after 8 years, in order to authorise their re-election, we require signatures from at least 10 of the main RNTA membership, in order to relax the constitution rule which specifies that people need to stand down for at least one year before being eligible for re-election.

George was pleased to report that 10 members had signed the form, at the start of the AGM, in order to relax this clause for the year 2023. Therefore, the following members of the committee offered themselves for election or re-election and the following were proposed:

This will be Charles' very last presentation to Rugby National Trust, as he is retiring from lecturing at the end of this year.




William Morris (1834-1896) – A Re-evaluation
